The Muscogee (Creek) Nation Department of Health (MCNDH) provides comprehensive health care services to Native Americans living within the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. MCNDH is an integrated system of six health centers, an Express Care Clinic, three hospitals, a physical rehabilitation center and nine comprehensive community health programs Offering services across the lifespan including pediatrics, family medicine, nursing, dental, laboratory, radiology, pharmacy, behavioral health, emergency medical, audiology, nutrition, physical therapy, and optometry.

DESCRIPTION OF ASSIGNMENT: The LPN Nurse Navigator position is to serve as a liaison/link/intermediary between primary care teams and diabetes program services to facilitate access to services and improve the quality-of-service delivery. This position is located at the Koweta Indian Health Center in Coweta, Ok.

REQUIREMENTS: Candidates must meet the following requirements:

Graduation from an accredited practical nursing curriculum is required. One (1) year relevant experience as an LPN. Incumbent is required to possess current licensure by the Oklahoma Board of Nursing for Practical Nursing and current CPR certification. It is the policy of MCNDH for all employees to comply with the COVID-19 vaccination program.

EVALUATION METHODS: Applicants who meet the requirements described above will be evaluated to determine the extent to which they possess or have the potential to acquire knowledge, skills, abilities and personal characteristics, (KSAP's) required of this position. <u>Applicants should address the following KSAP's on a separate attachment to their application</u>.

- 1. Strong clinical and human relation skills are required. Ability to effectively communicate both orally and in writing and maintains standards of clinical skills and professional ethics as established by the Nurse Practice Act.
- 2. Strong communication skills to work in a multidisciplinary team environment.
- 3. Excellent interpersonal, listening, critical thinking and organizational skills.
- 4. Team player that collaborates to achieve the highest outcomes.
- 5. Basic Assessment-Measure vital signs, literacy assessment and ability to follow protocols for patient intake. Assessment may include family/social support systems.
- 6. Pathophysiology, epidemiology, and clinical practice of stroke prevention, hypertension & blood pressure control.
- 7. Provide support, general information, guidance regarding assessing care, available blood pressure education/patient assistance programs.
- 8. Provide diabetes support and care in a cultural-openness manner.
- 9. Goal Setting- Help patients by providing information and assisting in setting goals for healthy eating and appropriate physical activity as defined by protocols.
- 10. Implementation- Refer/support blood pressure control management and offer guidance on accessing care and patient resources. May lead support groups and/or organize community physical activities and refer to the provider or diabetes educator as needed.
- 11. Knowledge of American Diabetes Association (ADA) standards of care and Indian Health Service (IHS) best practice guidelines for blood pressure control.
